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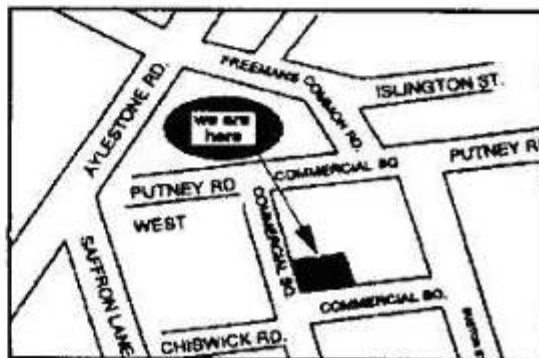
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EDITORIAL

CLERK OF COURSE REPORT **EATON LODGE – SUNDAY 7TH DECEMBER 2008**

Weekend of 21st November to 24th November 2008 involved Brian plus digger equalling large number of new holes and mounds to play with on a previously well known and driven site at Eaton.

The following Sunday 30th November, I was assisted by Brian, Andy and Simon to start laying out the sections on the revamped ground. By the end of the day with the weather deteriorating we had ten separate sections most of which had been driven.

On Saturday 6th December Andy, Simon and I eventually remembered the direction of the individual sections so enabling us to put the cane tops on correctly and then redrive them. As the previous week had seen torrential rain and the resultant ground conditions were extremely sticky, it became difficult to stand up let alone drive, some minor adjustments were required but remarkably not too many. The result was to have ten separate and challenging sections. Anticipating the rumour of additional entries from the P & D Club, space had been left between sections to allow for adequate parking between goes.

What a change one night makes? On Sunday morning, with a severe overnight frost, the ground became rock hard, I thought the sections might now prove to be too easy, but hey ho, that's trialling! As the competitors started to arrive I duly rechecked all the sections to ensure everything was ready for a prompt start. By the end of scrutineering we had nine entrants in class 9, six entrants in class 10 and two entrants in class 1, quite a good assortment.

Following marshalls' and drivers' briefings the trial duly got under way.

Section 1 saw a mixture of scores from 12 to 2, nobody able to get a clear.

Section 2 saw scores ranging from a 9 to a single clear from Donald.

Section 3 saw another mix of scores from a single 10 down to three clears.

Section 4 saw only one clear, again from Donald.

Section 5 saw the retirement of the Birch duo owing to a 'poorly' motor and scores ranging from 11 to 2.

Section 6 saw one 12 and two clears.

Sections 7 and 8 were in the gully and when previously test driven were extremely difficult to clear owing to the heavy rain. However on trial day with better weather nearly everybody found these two rather easy and collectively saw 22 clears.

Section 9 out of the gully field back into the cutting was cleared by 7 competitors.

Finally section 10 saw 9 clears and mainly 3's for the rest.

Overall, quite a mix of scores, lowest being Donald with only 8 penalties all day while the highest managed 61 penalties (excluding retirements). During the event Paul Butland and Jonathan Booty both transferred to Donald's motor, their's having 'died' earlier in the day.

I would like to thank all who took part as competitors, Andy for his help and use of land, the Marshall's whose attendance ensure we are able to run the trial and Brian for some interesting new challenges to compete over.

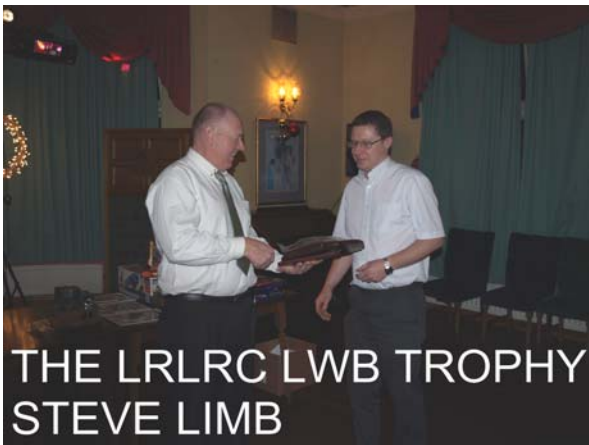

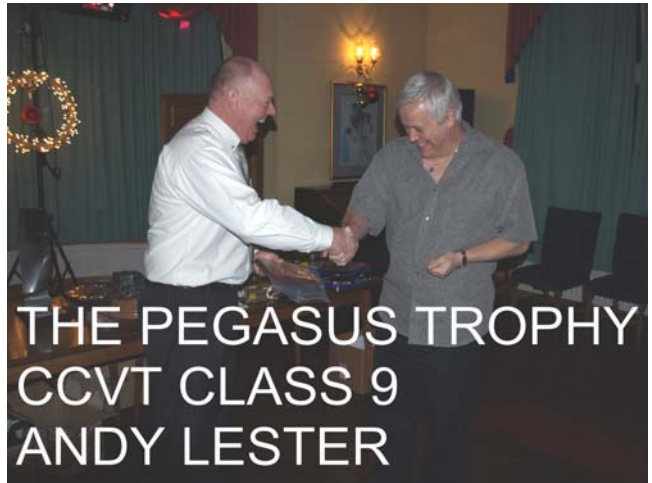
